

Tucked away in the northern corner of Singapore is a special farm, where the half a million-hens there lay what could be said to be the healthiest eggs in Singapore. A special hen diet there is the cornerstone of Chan Ah Huat Agriculture Farm's success.

A special diet created by Mr Chan causes the hens to produce eggs that contain thirty percent less cholesterol than other ordinary eggs. In fact, the Health Promotion Board has given the farm permission to label their eggs with the Healthier Choice symbol.

To achieve *this*, the farm had to lower the cholesterol level of the eggs by at least twenty-five percent. The farm decided that one way was to examine the foods that the hens ate. Hence, Mr Chan began to experiment with what he fed his hens. Finally, after more than a year of hard work, he came up with the secret feed formula that enabled him to achieve his goal.

For more than a year, Mr Chan Ah Huat and his son, Mr Chan Say Yong worked 14-hour days to manipulate the chicken feed after doing research on nutrition. Using a computer program  $\omega$  calculate the proportion of the ingredients, they were able to come up with many variations of the mixture in the chicken feed. They then selected 2 000 birds that were not choosy about what they are and had a good appetite from their coop. The eggs from these hens were sent to a laboratory to analyse.

Success did not come easy. Month after month, laboratory results showed that the cholesterol levels of eggs from the hens that had consumed various mixtures were only lowered marginally.

Mr Chan said, "We were always off by only a very few percentage points. We were disappointed initially, but thought that if we soldiered on, we would be able to make it."

In July last year, their persistence paid off. Their hens' eggs achieved the thirty percent mark. When pressed for the formula to their special feed, Both Mr Chan and his son did not want to comment, as the competition in this industry is stiff. With the 150 million eggs produced in Chan Ah Huat Agriculture Farm, they make up about 12 percent of Singapore's total egg consumption. Mr Chan's competitors are not going to have an easy time catching up.
