Jack London's *The Call of the Wild* delivers all the thrills and adventure you could possibly want in a book. In this classic novel, you'll follow the journey of Buck, a proud dog whose power, intelligence and courage make him a hero. Buck's adventure begins as a greedy gardener steals him from a comfortable California home. Buck has never known anything but love and easy living. Now he is beaten 5 and starved and his new life **confounds** him. Buck soon finds himself in the brutal setting of the 1897 Alaska gold rush. There, uncaring masters with gold fever put him to work as a sled dog.

The great dog uses every instinct to survive. Buck learns to sleep in snow.

Rather than cowering, he fights to be top dog. He wins the respect of every 10 person and beast he meets. Each test Buck faces brings out the best in him.

The Call of the Wild is clearly Buck's story. The only human character Lundon allows the reader to know is John Thornton. Through Buck's eye ou see Thornton's respect for his dogs and his fitness for life in the wild Yukon. You see love grow as Buck grasps Thornton's hand in his teeth and Thornton playfully shakes the dog's head. However, Thornton never engages the reader's emotions the way Buck does. It is Buck for whom most readers fear as ice cracks during a river crossing. It is Buck we follow to the very end of the journey.

London clearly describes the sights, sounds and smells of the frozen North: "Over the whiteness and silence brooded a ghostly calm. There was not the faintest 20 whisper of air — nothing moved, not a leaf quivered, the visible breath of the dogs rising slowly and lingering in the frosty air."

If you have ever loved an animal, *The Call of the Wild* will be a special joy for you. Jack London captures the bond between a human and a dog as no other author has. Yet London insists that every animal hears the call of the wild and longs to answer. You will never again look at your family pet in quite the same way after you have read the book.

The Call of the Wild was published in 1903 and has never been out of print. With its gripping scenes and portrait of an unforgettable dog, the book will keep you on the edge of your seat right up to the last page.



The next day, we swam with the mother turtles in the shallows and that evening, decided to visit the beach an hour earlier, to ensure a clear view or the hatchlings. Other resort guests had the same idea and we were rewarded with the sight of dozens of baby turtles clambering over the dunes and making a dash for the water.

However, we were horrified to see seagulls pecking off the hatchlings at will. The resort's briefing was very clear - let nature take its course but we could stand only so much torment watching the delicate, beautiful creatures being chomped on. Some guests rushed forward to frighten the birds away.

Feeling guilty, the humans went back to sit on the beach and watch the rescued babies head out to sea. Only one in 10 000 turtles would survive to adulthood. The guests thought they might have helped the hatchlings and were satisfied with themselves as the hatchlings dived between the waves. However, such satisfaction was shortlived.

"Look, is that a mother turtle out there?" one guest asked. It soon 25 became clear that what looked like turtle flippers were fins. The reef sharks were gathering for their supper. Reef sharks generally were harmless to humans but no brave saviour offered to swim out and shoo them away and evolution was left to take its relentless course. Nature did have a way of getting even.
