A shark is a primitive creature with a streamlined body. It breathes with the use of five to seven gill slits and has a special covering to protect its skin from damage and parasites. It also has replaceable teeth. As its teeth are constantly replaced throughout its life, some sharks can lose thirty thousand teeth in a lifetime. All sharks have multiple rows of teeth along the edges of their upper and lower jaws. The lower ones are 5 primarily used for holding its prey while the upper ones are for cutting it.

Over the years, a shark's teeth are prized by collectors for their beauty, and because they are the only surviving relics of ancient sharks that are now extinct. The skeleton of a shark is very different from that of bony fish. Its skeleton is made from rubbery cartilage, a tissue lighter and more flexible than the bone.

A shark also has a keen sense of smell which can detect the blood of any animal at least five hundred metres away. The nerves in its skin can also detect any movement in the water as far away as several kilometres. Furthermore, the shark never sleeps. Unlike most fish, it has no gas-filled swim bladder. So, it relies heavily on its large liver filled with oil. Therefore, it must constantly move about in the water in order to avoid sinking. A peculiar type of shark, Sand Tiger Shark, is known to gulp air from the surface and store it in their stomachs, using the stomach as a swim bladder.

Sharks will eat almost anything such as fish, animals, cans, bottles and all kinds of rubbish. Even old car registration plates and watches have been found inside the stomachs of dead sharks. Sharks will attack almost anything, even large boats. It is also not unusual for sharks to attack people in shallow water. The Tiger Shark, for example, is especially fond of swimming in shallow water and is a notorious killer. Another shark, the Mako, can jump six metres into the air and move through the water at fifty kilometres an hour. The Great White Shark, as shown in the film "Jaws", is an enormous man-eating shark. Usually, it can measure up to almost ten metres and weigh as much as a thousand kilograms! The Bull Shark, on the other hand, is rarely more than four metres long, but it is the deadliest of all sharks.

Contrary to popular belief, only a few sharks are dangerous to humans. These sharks rarely attack humans unless provoked. The perception of sharks as dangerous animals has been popularised by publicity given to a few isolated unprovoked attacks. Popular fictional works about shark attacks, such as the 'Jaws', have also portrayed the image of sharks as man-eating monsters.

Three years ago on the last day of January, I had a big problem. I can't forget this day forever. The story began when my uncle, my cousin, and I decided to go hunting. We went back to the camp where we cooked our dinner. We ate the delicious food, drank Arabic coffee, and sat around the fire talking until midnight. Then we went to bed.

We left camp the next day at seven in the morning. We went north and found two kinds of birds and caught them. However, we soon faced trouble because the car got stuck in the sand! We spent about three hours trying to pull out the car without any progress. Finally, we decided that it was best to walk. It was then that I was faced with a dilemma. I had to convince my uncle about how hard it is for an old man or a young boy to walk more than forty kilometres in the desert. Reluctantly, he agreed to let me go. So I took a bottle of water with me and started to walk south alone. I knew the way well, but it was a long way in the sand. I walked for more than four hours without stopping. I felt tired and thirsty. I drank all the water which was in the bottle. I stopped to rest, sleeping around two hours.

When I got up, darkness had covered the area. "What should I do?" I 30 asked myself. I continued to walk south. I was worried about my uncle and cousin. Suddenly, I met a Bedouin man who was riding his camel. He gave me a lift to his house. When I had had enough rest, he took me to the road where I hitched a ride from a passing car that took me to the city. I had one day to get back to my uncle and cousin. When I got back to them, they were so happy 35 because I had returned.

I learned a lesson from this experience, which was that the desert is very dangerous. Next time, when we go hunting, we must go in groups with two or more cars. If we go together, we can keep one another safe. We know the desert is dangerous, but we will never quit hunting.
