

On 14 October 2014, tracker dogs led some rangers to a group of armed poachers who were on the run. The poachers had shot and killed a well-known elephant just outside Tarangire National Park. This was the latest in a string of successes by Tanzania's tracker dogs. The dogs are proving to be an effective weapon in the war against elephant poaching in the extreme terrains and harsh climate of East Africa which are daunting for humans.

"Apart from their incredible tracking abilities, dogs are wonderful to work with because they don't have any political agenda," said Damien Bell, director of Big Life Tanzania, the conservation organisation that manages the Big Life Tracker Dog Unit.

It was early in the morning when rangers found the dead elephant, deep in the forested Lesimingori Mountains in Tanzania where protection for elephants is sometimes weaker. It died, from a single bullet to the head, after wandering into the rolling foothills in an attempt to migrate as it had done several times before.

Strangely, the animal's tusks were still in place when the authorities' arrived at the scene in the morning. It appeared that the poachers were startled by fast-acting community members and rangers and had abandoned the carcass before they had time to remove its huge teeth and make their escape. For other anti-poaching operations, this is often the end of the story. Criminals escape. Scene is investigated. Report is written and filed away. However, this was not how it went down this time. Rocky and the Big Life Foundation Tracker Dog Unit were called in to pursue the criminals on foot.

Rocky arrived at the scene with his handlers, and soon he was sniffing and pacing up and down beside the dead elephant, about to explode with excitement. He had picked up the human scents from footprints near the carcass. It seemed that multiple people had been at the crime scene the night before. Then the dogs were off on their dusty trail. Rocky led the chase through the foothills and scrublands of the Lesimingori, frantically tugging his handler at the end of the lead. After five hours of relentless progress, the heat finally wore him down and his protégé, Rosdus, took over.

Rosdus, new to the unit, did not disappoint his mentor. He took the team all the way to the main highway, where the other dogs and handlers followed his lead through the town and into a particular home. There, a man

admitted that the poachers had come to the house in the middle of the night, urgently asking to have their cell phones charged. After further interrogation, the man provided information that led directly to the capture of the suspects.
Since their arrival, Rocky and Rosdus have helped with countless anti-poaching operations, leading to numerous arrests. In fact, the dog teams have become so popular that the non-profit organisation, Tanzania National Parks (TANAPA), the Wildlife Division (a separate agency) and even government agencies like the police and military have requested for their assistance.
Canine sleuths are not limited to the plains of East Africa. In the Congo, bloodhounds are assisting in the fight against the poaching of the world's last remaining mountain gorillas. Anatolian shepherd dogs are also widely used in Africa to lessen human-wildlife conflict on farms, where the instinctively protective dogs defend livestock from predators.
