

They climbed aboard and paddled their way out to join the rest of the fishermen. Tatau stayed at home and went about her normal daily morning chores.

While the brothers were catching tuna, Joe heard his mother screaming for help. He told Roy to stay quiet for a moment. Since they heard no other sound, they went back to their fishing. Moments later, they both heard their dog at home barking non-stop. Both brothers knew that something was wrong. They quickly paddled back to shore. They ran to the house while calling out for their mother. However, all they found was their dog helplessly growling. Tatau was nowhere to be seen. The boys knew something terrible had happened to their mother.

Joe and Roy searched the house and found giant footprints. They quickly deduced that a giant had taken their mother. Giant abductions were common in other villages from time to time. Gathering their bags, axes and spears with their dog following the scent of the glant's trail, they set out in the hope that their mother might still be alive.
