

Their behaviour is affected by these factors: nutrition, stress, illness and genetic issues.

Obesity or being underweight usually leads to poor health and a shorter lifespan. They may also suffer from chronic diseases!

Prevention of dental diseases is achieved by paying close attention to your pet's diet, regular brushing with pet toothpaste and toothbrushes and rinsing with special gels. As with human teeth, dental disease is caused when residual food, bacteria and calcium deposits form plaque and tartar on your pet's teeth. Failure to address these problems may result in bacteria carried into your pet's bloodstream, causing severe, long-term oral health issues that are sometimes fatal.

The ship slowly moved away from the dock. Her crew worked busily while the passengers stood on the decks, some looking out at the sea and others waving to their families and friends. Apart from the crew, I was the only one who had no friends or relatives with me or to see me off. In one pathetic move, I raised my hand to wave goodbye to Singapore.

The huge merchant vessel carried both cargo and passengers. It moved at about ten nautical miles per hour. Navigation was by landmarks and compass bearings, the stars in the night and sun positions in the day. The journey would take thirty-nine days with six stopovers between Singapore and Southampton.

The crew of about thirty consisted of the captain, deck officers, engineers, stewards, cooks and sailors. Everything in the ship was basic and functional including my third-class four-person cabin. All the cabins had an area of about fourteen square metres, a height of two metres and a small porthole for ventilation. I shared my cabin with an elderly Frenchman named Anton, a Portuguese priest and a quiescent young man of unknown nationality. There were not many variety of activities on board. The days I had on the ship were spent on eating, sleeping, reading, writing my diary and looking at the stars and the sea.

The first part of the journey was through the Straits of Malacca. The voyage should be smooth unless we had the misfortune to meet pirates that plied the route targeting Europe-bound ships. The passengers were given strict instructions to stay in the cabins if the ship were to slow down and a signal was sounded. The captain and his officers would handle the pirates and after a bit of delay, we would be on our way again. If the ship was robbed of some of its coal, we would have to stop over at Penang for bunkering and the trip would be extended by two days. Fortunately, we did not have such an encounter and headed for Colombo without any trouble.

For twelve days, we were blessed with fine weather and small storms that came and went quickly. Mother Nature displayed her full glory with sensational sunrises and sunsets, and beautiful rainbows that spanned the sky after showers. However, on the thirteenth day, the ship hit a tropical cyclone that threw it about ferociously. Gigantic waves behaved like whips rather than bodies of water. Things were crashing down, people were falling and every other person was throwing up. Anton, who was partially blind and deaf, clung tightly to me. He was shouting words that I did not understand and was yelling even louder thinking that I could not hear him.

After a while, the young man of unknown nationality told me the old man needed his medicine that could be found in a bag under the bunk bed. When Anton had his medicine, he seemed sedated and released his clasp on me. I stayed close to him in case he needed more help.

Twenty-four hours passed and the storm was still raging. None of the passengers ventured outside and the cabins were getting into an uninhabitable state. If one did not get nauseated from motion sickness, it would be from the foul smell of vomit. No food was served and nobody had the appetite anyway. I could not take it on the second day of the storm and I went to stand at the deck for some fresh air.
