The goblin shark is definitely not a beauty. Luckily, it does not need to look pretty since it is found in the ocean depths. A distinctive <u>trait</u> is its long protruding blade-like shout. It (16) also has a pink body which is pretty unusual but, by far, the most <u>bizarre</u> aspect of this (17) shark is its jaw – it has an extendable jaw with sharp teeth. The usefulness of this feature had been <u>discussed deliberately</u> among scientists but they agreed that this extendable jaw (18) makes it easier to catch prey.

The average length of a goblin shark is 1.6 metres and the longest recorded length is 3.8 metres. These animals are as slow as fortoises, which can make it hard for them to chase their prey. Although research suggests that it is not a particularly rare creature, the goblin shark lives mostly in areas which are uninhabited. This makes it difficult to track it (20)



When my head started to spin from the daily labour and lack of food, I kept my eyes shut for a few seconds and dreamt of eating some delicious food - the kind I saw every day when I walked past the bakery. I did not know how any of the food tasted, but it looked beautiful so I imagined its delicious taste.

Every day since my mother fell ill, I had to stand at traffic junctions, begging people to buy window shields. Days went by under the blazing sun as I tried to earn a livelihood for my family. At times, the sun's intensity was so unbearable that I passed out due to the heat. Occasionally, a kind stranger sprinkled water on my face, offered me some water and left a coin in my hand.
