I was glad to hear from my Japanese teacher, Sensei, but his letter also worried me. It was 1945. The British had just returned to Singapore. Sensei and the other Japanese had become Prisoners of War (POW). Young Singaporeans were anxious and confused having had to move from one ruling party to another.

I was surprised that Sensei had not yet been sent back to Japan. In fact, I was happy to learn that he was still in Singapore. He was well-treated and classified as a civilian, not a possible war crime suspect. My worry was for myself. I had received a letter from the enemy! Although the enemy was detained, the letter could have still attracted the attention of our new rulers, particularly some special police department responsible for keeping secret information about people in their colony. What if I were barred from 10 education and deprived of jobs? Surely they were now watching me – to see how I would respond to Sensei's letter. Indeed the envelope looked as if it had been opened and re-sealed.

The memories came flooding back as I read Sensei's letter. The last time I saw him was at his home in Cavanagh Road, the time when Singapore was known as Syonanto. 15 He had said, "Take these shoes. They're new. They look too big for you but you're still growing and someday they'll fit. I don't mind going into the POW camp in my old sandals."

I felt sorry for Sensei. He had been teaching in a school in Japan when the Japanese Imperial Army forced him to teach the Japanese language to the conquered people of Southeast Asia. My friends and I soon found him different from all those arrogant and nasty soldiers who treated us like dirt and imprisoned individuals based on their whims. Sensei provided his students with precious food rations, and more importantly, found them jobs. He stuck his neck out to help them. He even took the risk of speaking up for his students and their relatives who had somehow offended the *Kempeita*i, the all-powerful Japanese Military Police.

I remembered vividly that when my neighbour's father was detained by the Japanese Military Police for kicking a Japanese flag, my neighbour, Keong, went to Sensei for help. In his shoes, I might have chickened out. However, Sensei went to the Japanese Military Police, and got Keong's dad released. After this incident, Sensei was a hero in our eyes.

Sensei must have been feeling desperately low in his detention camp. I owed it to him to visit him. Looking back, I wondered why he had given me his shoes. Sensei was not one to show favouritism towards his students and the shoes were too big for me. Yet, I wondered if I would get blacklisted if I went to visit him.

Much to my relief, my fears were groundless. When I eventually visited Sensei, I left the detention camp unscathed. During the visit, Sensei explained that he had given me the shoes as a sign of our friendship but I was filled with sadness as I could not reciprocate Sensei's kind gesture. As I left the prison, I wondered what I could do to help my teacher as he seemed to be so sad to see me go even though he was exuberant when I arrived.


