



A British millionaire is continuing his fight against a government threat to 1 deport a Nepalese youth he now considers his own son. He is keeping a promise made to the boy's father ten years ago.

Richard Morfey, aged forty-one, became seriously ill while climbing the Himalayas. His life was saved by a local guide who ran for three days across the 5 mountains to fetch help.

When he had recovered, Richard Morley searched for the guide, Basu Khadka Basu Khadka, who suffered from a weak heart, refused any money as a reward. Instead, he asked Mr Morley to take care of his son if he should die. Mr Morley willingly agreed.

Morley and Basu Khadka wrote to one another for several years. Then the correspondence stopped. Morley went at once to the Himalayas. There he discovered Khadka had died of a heart attack. He then set about finding his son, Javaram. It took him more than a month.

"He was in rags and destitute, living on the floor of a restaurant. He was 15 working as a goatherd and down a mine," recalled Richard Morley.

Modey brought Jayaram back to England. He gave him a fine education with a private tutor. Modey had no children of his own and his wife had died. He now wants Jayaram to inherit all his property and money.

However, there is a problem. Morley had brought Jayaram into Britain as a visitor. Morley said he was eighteen when in fact he was only fourteen. Morley says he did not know the true age when the boy arrived. Five months after his arrival, he tried to change the visitor's visa to one allowing permanent residence. This was refused, and so far many appeals have been refused. A fresh appeal was made to the Home Secretary yesterday.

"I cannot understand the attitude of my government," declared Richard Morley. "Jayaram has cost the British people nothing, and he will cost them nothing in the future. His father saved my life, and I must keep my promise. If he is not allowed to stay in Britain, we shall leave the country forever. The attitude of the Home Office is foolish and inhumane. To me, this is clearly a bad case of 30 racism."

"I have had no problems adapting to life in England," said Jayaram yesterday, "and I want to stay, I would now be a stranger in Nepal. Richard has looked after me like a father. I now call him my father."

A Home Office spokesperson would only say, "When people from overseas come into this country, there are certain rules to be obeyed."

Read the passage below and answer questions 81 to 90. (20 marks) I first met Sheba in 1956. I was a third grade student. She was a seven-weekold kitten in a pet-shop window. She caught my eye immediately. I had always wanted a kitten, or at least that was what I told myself when I saw her there on display. At first she did not even notice me standing there. I tried tapping on the glass 5 but her concentration remained elsewhere as she gave full attention to the task at hand. A thousand generations of hunting and stalking instinct were brought to bear as she successfully brought down her quarry - her sister's tail. I tapped again. She stared at me for a moment, and the bond was made. Following a brief discussion through the glass, we concluded that we were made for 10 each other. I vowed to return later in the day to take her home with me. Unfortunately, I soon found that the road to kitten ownership was not without obstacles. Mum and Dad did not think much of my plans. It seemed that they knew quite a lot about the subject of acquiring pets. "Who ever heard of paying money for a cat? A kitten is something that you can get for free at any barn. Besides, we're dod 15 people." I was not sure what that meant but, even at eight years old, I could see that the only true stumbling stone here was the finances. You see, Sheba came with a stiff price tag, two dollars and fifty cents. "A lot of money for something that you can get for free anywhere." 30 Getting my way this time was not going to be easy. However, I felt up to the challenge at hand and after a day of typical little kid whining and a chunk of "birthday money" that came from Uncle Ron, Sheba was mine. Sheba slept on my bed every night. We had long and meaningful conversations when no one else was around. In fact, Sheba was largely responsible 25 for my deciding somewhat early in life to pursue a career as a veterinarian. Through my high school, college and veterinarian school, Sheba remained a close feline friend. Many important decisions regarding my career were influenced by conversations, whether real or imagined, with Sheba. It was her influence once again that got me thinking about opening a 30 veterinary hospital for cats only. In June of 1978, my new hospital opened its doors. Sheba was twenty-two on opening day when Mum and Dad brought her to the new hospital she had inspired. They did not warn me in advance that there was second reason for the visit. Sheba looked horrible. She had become quite ill that week, I did a thorough 35 check on her and was forced to a bitter conclusion.
