

Speed-loving Italians now have a good reason to become traffic policement a \$310,000 high-speed Lamborghini Gallardo. Italy's state police presented the sieck sports car, bedecked with a siren, painted blue-and-white and with the word "Polizia" or "police" stencilled on the side, to the public amidst much publicity. Many people, both young and old, turned up to catch a glimpse of the tat. A police spokesman disclosed that the Lamborghini will go into action later this month and will be used mainly on Italy's highways. The car is also reported to have a 500hp engine and a top speed of more than 300 km/h. Such a powerful machine should make all crooks think twice before they commit a crime.

The gleaming piece of machinery was handed over by the classic Italian car manufacturer as the police force celebrated its 152<sup>nd</sup> birthday. Manufacturers have replaced the traditional cone-style flashin blue lights on the roof with an improved version to give the car a smooth and graceful shape. A spokesman for Italy's central police headquarters in Rome said, "We are expecting a lot of new applicants when they see this new car. However, an influx of new applicants also gives us the luxury of being stricter in our selection." He stressed that the vehicles also had a humanitarian aspect. "These cars will be equipped with emergency medical equipment such as a defibrillator, electrocardiogram machine and special compartments for the rush transportation of emergency blood and donor organs," he added.

Lamborghini is owned by Voikswagen. It is based near Bologna in northern Italy. To date, only the rich and famous can afford to drive a Lamborghini. When this fast and sleek Lamborghini patrols the highways later this month, it is widely believed that the masterpiece will generate great publicity and artithe young and daring to join the police force.

Like many other young men, Bette's husband, though reluctant to leave his wife and child, was forced to take up arms. By the time the war was over, love had gone too. Bette's husband never came back. Here she was, a single mother without a proper education and no time and money to follow her dream. Necessity forced. Bette to take up a job as an executive secretary. It was the late forties and in those days, typewriters did not have delete buttons. Error after error would appear on the documents she was typing. Bette was losing time and nerves.

One day, it struck her that painters have a great life. If they are not happy with their painting, they just paint over the spot they dislike and they are right back on track. She went home and started experimenting with tempera colours, mixing different shades until she finally created a colour that perfectly matched the colour of the stationery. The next day, Bette was happily typing away, correcting every error with the help of her cohoperion. It was a breeze! Her work was easier and she became more effective. It did not take long for the rest of the secretaries to see how efficient her system was. They started asking her for some of the stuff she was using. Bette obliged and handed out bottles labelled, 'Mistake Out'.

Word spread fast! Here was this 'magic liquid' that made work so much easier. Soon, the orders for her special concection started mounting. By 1956, Bette founded the Mistake Out Co. in Dallas, Texas. It was a simple operation. She mixed her concection in kitchen blenders while her son and his friends did the bottling. She worked day and night and even on weekends, but somehow the business did not seem to be able to grow. The extreme workload took its toll and Bette's health suffered. Her attention at work was not always totally focused. Then something happened. She made a mistake at work that was seen as irredeemable and she got fired! No amount of pleading could make her employer change his mind.

The magic moment had happened! Bette had been frantically holding on to her job, accepting a meditodre income even though a huge opportunity was staring her right in the face. Losing her job meant more time for her: time to sell her product and expand her fledgling company.
