The burro played a significant role in the history of the American West. It was this animal) that carried the supplies needed by the miners and by the mining towns that sprang up in remote mountainous areas.

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Many westerners today still remember the importance of the burro. When western towns have a celebration, a common feature of the day is a burro race. For the race, each burro is 'dressed up' and carries a saddle. At the start of the race, the burros are tied to a fence some distance shead of the owners. At a signal, the owners run to their animals, until them and start on the course.

The course usually begins on the main street of town but quickly takes the competitors up rough mountain paths. The burros may be coaxed, pushed or pulled. Yet(the) are r(ever) actually ridden.

One well-known competition, the International Burro Race takes place in Leadsville, Colorado, each August. The course there takes the contestants up into the Mosquito Range of mountains. The men run a distance of twenty-one miles, the women slightly less. Sometimes, they start out dressed in summer garb, only to run into snow up in Mosquito Pass. The course forms roughly a square, bringing burro and owner back to a lower point on the main street, to run uphill to the finish line.

The finish can be unpredictable. A stubborn animal can suddenly balk as it comes to the waiting and often noisy crowd. A burno owner who appears to have triumphed easily has turned into a loser at the <u>last minute</u>. The final victor receives a <u>eask prize</u>. However, many a winner is in a state of collapse. He or she may be too weak to reach the judges' stand for the prize, after using every last bit of strength, to push a stubborn burno across the finishing line!
