The goblin shark is definitely not a beauty. Luckily, the goblin shark does not need to

look pretty since it is found in the ocean depths. A distinctive <u>trait</u> is its long protruding (16)

blade-like snout. It also has a pink body which is pretty unusual but, by far, the most

<u>bizarre</u> aspect of this shark is its jaw – it has an extendable jaw with sharp teeth. The (17)

usefulness of this feature had been <u>a heated discussion</u> among scientists but they agreed (18)

that this extendable jaw makes it easier to catch prey.

The average length of a goblin shark is 1.6 metres and the longest recorded length is 3.8 metres. These animals are as slow as tortoises, which can make it hard for them to chase food. Although research suggests that it is not a particularly rare creature, the (19) goblin shark lives mostly in areas which are uninhabited. This makes it difficult to track it (20)

for long periods of time.

An estimated one billion people ride bicycles every day – for transport, recreation and sport. Shouldn't you be a part of them?



#### Do You Know ...?

The first bicycles were completely different and were not as comfortable as now. In 1817, the concept of cycling was invented by Baron Karl von Drais. What he invented wasn't exactly the bicycle which we know and use. It did have a typical bicycle frame and two wheels, but it was propelled by walking as opposed to pedalling.

Look behind you before you turn, overtake or stop.

Use arm signals before you turn right or left.

Never use a mobile phone while cycling.

Don't use headphones while cycling.

When cycling past parked cars, watch out for car doors opening suddenly and allow room to pass safely.

A good working bicycle is a must. If you are buying a second-hand bicycle or you have an old bicycle that has been gathering dust, consider having it serviced at a bicycle shop to ensure it is roadworthy.

If you are buying a new one, there are plenty of models to choose from. Mountain bikes are the most popular among cyclists. A bicycle specialist can advise you on the correct frame size and help you select a bicycle to suit your budget and the type of cycling you want to do.

For most people, cycling is a safe and effective form of exercise. If you have any health concerns or an existing medical problem, see your doctor before you start.


