Since 1859, orchids have been closely associated with the Singa Botanic Gardens. Breeding 2 or more species of orchids together results in a new hybrid orchid. The products of the orchid breeding programme, which began in 1928, deserve a place where they can be displayed in their full splendour. The design of these orchids is 'hand-crafted' by the horticultural staff who are dedicated to bringing out the finest in any hybrid.



It offers a permanent showcase which is the largest collection of orchids in the world. Over 1000 species and 2000 hybrids are now on display. Every year, more vibrant hybrids will be added on.

Burkill Bungalow

It was built in 1866 and situated at the highest point in the Gardens. It has a commanding view over the Temasek Orchid Garden, the Palm Valley and the Rain Forest. It was designed to be cool and airy with high ceilings and. broad verandahs on the first floor. The wooden pillars are made from a single trunk of the native *Tempinis* tree. Once home of the Gardens' directors.

Jubilee Heritage Garden



Singapore has been a centre of orchid breeding from the 1930s. Some early hybrids have left significant footprints in the world of orchids and have become part of Singapore's floral heritage. These hybrids have been internationally awarded, have become important in the cut-flower trade or have been named after historical figures. Some are important as breeding stock for many of today's hybrids. Vanda Miss Joaquim was chosen to be the National Flower of Singapore in 1981. This exquisite flower was discovered by Miss Agnes Joaquim in her garden in 1893.

Chill House

Trees and rocks are draped with spectacular orchids and carnivorous plants. The cool air and drifting mist provide a highly realistic representation of the tropical forest and will be an unforgettable experience for you. One orchid to look out for is Bulbophyllum echinolabium, which boasts the largest flower in its species. Its spectacular blooms can measure up to 30 cm long and can last for about 10 days. It is native to Sulawesi and Borneo. Many more interesting orchid species can be found in the Chill House. Come and spot them!

Noble Orchid Garden

It was carefully styled and sited as an English backyard garden of Burkill Bungalow. It features the outstanding orchid hybrids of the Gardens' orchid programme. As Singapore orchids gained fame, it became obvious that they should be used as agents to promote goodwill and foster closer ties between nations. The government has honoured State visitors and other delegates by naming selected orchid hybrids after them.

Whenever orders for washing did come in, Suzanne's mother would be too exhausted by the end of the working day to offer her young daughter any company. Therefore, young Suzanne was often left to her own devices. She grew up feeling terribly alone, sometimes even wondering if her mother really cared for her at all.

Suzanne had no playground but the streets. While out playing, she saw street vendors, usually stout women with hands covered in rough skin, selling fruits and vegetables. They created such an impression on her that she would sometimes scratch pictures of them on the pavement with a piece of charcoal given to her by a sympathetic coal man.

Suzanne dreamt of becoming an artist one day. However, she had to put that on hold. There were other pressing needs like acquiring a livelihood which commanded her attention and time. Suzanne only attended primary school until the age of eleven before she had to start working.

Suzanne first worked as a dressmaker's assistant who took the orders of rich ladies when they came to have their dresses made. She subsequently waited on tables and even trained and performed as an acrobat in a circus. Unfortunately, a fall from a trapeze caused her to suffer a broken leg and she had to stay in the hospital for months. The accident put a stop to her short-lived career as an acrobat. Nevertheless, Suzanne continued to draw even when she was in the hospital. During that time, she used the plaster cast on her leg as a canvas for her drawings. After she had recovered, she returned to help her mother out in the laundry business.

One day in 1880, Suzanne delivered a load of washing to an artist's home. The artist, Chavannes, noticed her graceful manners so he asked her to become his model. Thus, Suzanne embarked on her new job of modelling for other artists over the next ten years. During her modelling career, she continued to draw. She would occasionally sell her drawings for a small sum of money in order to supplement her income. The subjects of her drawings were always the poor working people of her childhood.



Then, Lady Luck dealt her a fair hand in life. Suzanne's drawings were accidentally spotted by the influential artist, Lautrec. He liked what he saw and decided to find out more about the artist. He then met up with Suzanne and introduced her to a fellow artist friend, Degas, who then trained her in the Impressionist style of painting, Both Lautrec and Degas encouraged Suzanne to pursue her passion and she worked very hard at it. Degas was so impressed with Suzanne's tenacity and brilliant artwork that he organised a solo exhibition for her. From there, her fame as an artist took flight. In 1894, Suzanne became the first woman painter to be admitted into the prestigious National Society of | 45 Fine Arts in France. Despite the ups and downs of her personal life, Suzanne remained dedicated to her art until her very last days. As she related shortly before her death, "My work is finished and the only satisfaction I gain is that I have never surrendered.
