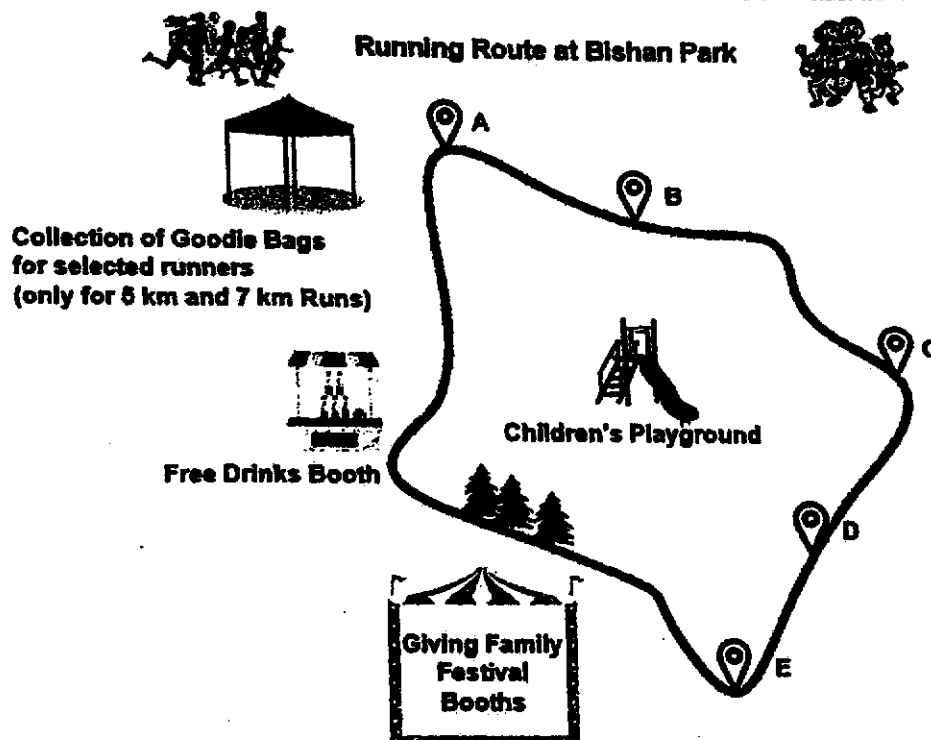
Join the Run to Raise Funds!

As the headman of a rice plantation, Wang was known for being impatient. One day, he was snappier than usual. A tiger had crept up on two of his workers during midday and made a hasty meal of them before they could even shout for help. Wang was now short of two workers.

This made Wang waste no time in meeting all the plantation workers that evening to inform them of the danger and offer a \$200 reward to anyone who could kill the tiger. Peng Hoe, a plantation worker, asked with fear in his eyes, "Sir, can you supply us with guns? We definitely want to catch it as our lives are at stake. However, what chance do we have against the tiger with our small knives?" 5

The only gun belonged to Wang and he was too afraid to shoot the tiger himself so he decided to deny it. "There is no gun here," he said dismissively. "Anyway, you men have your knives and there are so many of you against that lone tiger." He then added awkwardly, "The reward will now be \$400 for the man who gets rid of this tiger!" With that, he left the meeting. 10

Rami, a young plantation worker whose eyes had narrowed when Wang denied having a gun, told the men, "We must kill that tiger before it gets any more of us. I heard from someone that Master Wang owns a gun." Ali, another plantation worker, who was listening intently, spoke up, "Really? If that is true, Wang can lead us to kill the tiger. Let me ask him!" Peng Hoe and the rest of the men cheered him on as he ran after Wang. 15

When asked, an indignant Wang replied, "Yes, I own a gun but why should I lead the men to kill it?"

Ali was surprised at the answer but persisted, "But Sir, you are the only one who knows how to use the gun." 20

"How about this? I'll lend you the gun. You just need to aim it at the tiger and squeeze the trigger," Wang offered. "And you can still have the \$400 reward." With that, he left and returned with a large rifle which he placed in Ali's reluctant hands.

Ali trudged back to the waiting workers. Though he had no experience with guns, he decided that he would make the best of the situation. He started hatching a plan to give them the best chance of killing the tiger. He told the workers about Wang's refusal to help, which drew loud complaints about Wang's cowardice. However, when he told them of his plan, it was met with approving nods. 25

That night, dressed in dark clothing, twenty men who had volunteered to help, arrived at the agreed venue for the tiger hunt, each carrying an empty tin can and a stick. They followed Ali's earlier plan and spread out, making a long line through the plantation. Then, they started shouting and banging the tin cans with their sticks as loudly as they could to lure the tiger out of its hiding place. 30

Under the cover of the trees, the nervous men moved cautiously. It was hard to see in the dim light and the shadows played tricks on them many times. Suddenly, after a few seconds of loud rustling in the trees came a terrific roar as a huge tiger leaped out right in front of them. Confused and angered by the noise, and faced with so many humans, it paced left and right, down the line of men, unsure about which one to pounce on. 35

Ali's plan was working! Although terrified, the men carried on banging their tin cans as they closed ranks around the hesitant tiger. Although it was snarling and baring its teeth, Ali calmly stepped forward, aimed his rifle carefully and...Bang! Bang! Bang! He shot the tiger stone dead. Shouting triumphantly, the men lifted Ali into the air and carried him all the way back to Wang's house. An astonished Wang, roused from his slumber, opened the door. He had not expected such teamwork from them. Wordlessly, he handed over the reward, which Ali generously shared with the twenty men, praising them for their bravery and teamwork. To everyone watching, it was clear that while Ali was not the headman, he was certainly the better leader. 40

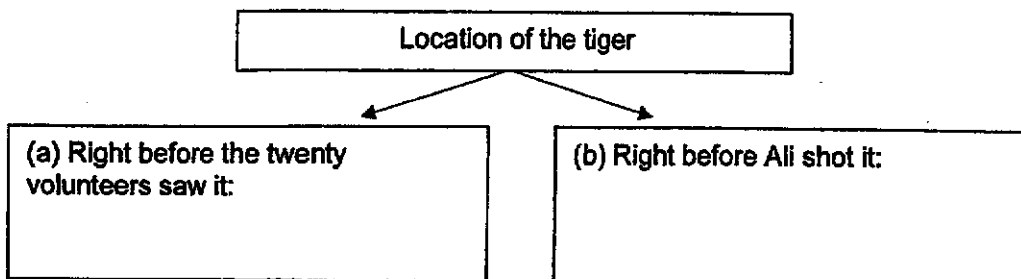
