





The most I managed was five. Baba was there, watching, and he patted Hassan on the back and even put his arm around his shoulder. I wanted Baba all to myself. How I wished Baba would notice me more. I always felt like Baba hated me a little. Why not? After all, I had killed his beloved wife, his beautiful princess, when I was born, hadn't I? The least I could have done was to have had the decency to have turned out a little more like him. But I hadn't turned out like him. Not at all.
