Mr Veera was five when his father died of an illness. To make ends meet, his mother worked as a nanny to support the family. Their relatives helped to raise him and his siblings. In primary school, the young Mr Veera looked like "a rag doll" in oversized uniforms passed down from his older brothers. He often went to school carrying his textbooks in a paper bag.

On rainy days, he would hold the bag close to his chest so it would not tear. Once, the bag was torn. "I had to look for another bag in the rubbish bin," he recounted. His teacher, Mrs Chee, noticed his damaged bag and gathered the boy's classmates to donate a school bag and stationery to him. Mr Veera said that the gifts from his classmates made a big difference in his life.

Mrs Chee's kind act motivated the young boy to work hard. Gaining confidence, Mr Veera went on to graduate with a degree.

Mr Veera hoped that his story would show that acts of kindness, no matter how small, could make big changes in someone's life. As an adult, he paid it forward by buying food for elderly people and helping children with special needs.

Skateboarding began in California in the 1950s. Surfers were looking for an activity to enjoy when the waves were unsuitable for surfing. The sport was also known as sidewalk surfing. The first skateboards were wooden boxes with roller skate wheels attached to the bottom. They became so popular that skateboard companies soon formed. Later, better skateboards were built with rounded fronts like the boards of today.

By the 1960s, concerns about skateboard injuries caused a big drop in sales. The high number of skateboard injuries seen in hospital emergency rooms led to many cities banning skateboarding. City officials urged stores not to sell skateboards and parents not to buy them. Children did not wear helmets and protective gear back in those days, and the wheels were made of baked clay that skidded easily. As there were no skateparks, skateboarders skated on the streets. They disrupted traffic and bothered pedestrians.

In 1972, a young surfer named Frank Nasworthy came up with the idea of using wheels we have today, made of a soft material. The wheels gripped the ground much better, allowing for a smoother ride. In 1978, Alan Gelfand developed a trick where he jumped with his skateboard seemingly attached to his feet. This trick, called the "Ollie", is now the basis for most skateboarding tricks today.

Skateboarding has grown in popularity as an unlikely outcome from the lockdown caused by the pandemic in 2020. The sport can be practised anywhere. Even older generations who used to skate in their youth are now re-engaging with skateboarding.
