SIGHTS OF LITTLE INDIA

Walk down Buffalo Road which was once lined with many buffalo pens. In days of old, many snake charmers, fortune tellers, astrologers, palmists, numerologists, even parrot astrologers piled their trade here. During religious festivals, people would seek them out, hoping to discover what the future held.

Campbell Lane is a hive of activity during Hindu festivals like Deepavali, when a lively bazaar spirit fills the air. Vendors offer traditional handicrafts and garments, jewellery, carpets, food spices and flower garlands.

HALLMARKS

Over at Little India Arcade, you will find an ideal snapshot of culture and traditions. Here you can find the sari, a traditional garment for Indian women. It comprises a long single piece of fabric approximately 5.5 metres in length and 1 metre in width, expertly wound round a woman's body like a skirt, with the loose end thrown over the shoulder.

As you stand on Serangoon Road, you will see a large number of 'yellow gold' jewellery stores. A hot item is the *Nevarethinam*, a ring encrusted with nine different gems representing the nine planets in the solar system and it is mainly worn by men.

FLAVOURS

Race Course Road was named after Singapore first exclusive race course in 1843. Today, everyone is welcome at the host of restaurants along the road, which offer every conceivable Indian speciality. It is the ideal place for the gastronomically curious. Do drop by the *Banana Leaf* and *Muthu's Curry* located along the same street.

There is also a host of bread you simply must try. Upper Dickson Road is just the place to try some *appom* or *thosai*, *chapatti*, *puri*, *prata* and *naan*. Excellent when eaten with curries.
