

The Ocean





When I was eight, I had a gaping hole in one of my molars, the consequence of consuming excessive amount of cakes and sweets, and not practising good dental hygiene. Brushing my teeth was often done within minutes. Unable to afford any expensive treatments, my mother tried all kinds of useless remedies to ease my suffering. One of those was to stuff a small piece of cotton wool moistened with some medicated oil into the cavity on the tooth. It would temporarily numb the pain but the decay and the suffering would continue.

In the end, my mother had no choice but to take me to a quack dentist, operating in one of the shop houses near our home. As far as I could recollect, there were only a few certified dentists then. In any case, we could not afford their treatment. Entering the clinic, we saw a few other patients waiting. All of a sudden, I heard high-pitched drilling sounds coming out from the dental room. That was enough to make me go down on my knees and beg my mother to go home. I promised her that I would not eat any more sweets. Unfortunately, my mother had a heart of stone.

Soon, my name was called. I dragged my feet into the room. It was sparsely furnished, with a dental chair and bottles of anaesthetic lining the shelves. The pungent smell from antibacterial soap wafted into my nose. A stern-looking nurse ordered me to sit on the dental chair. After a casual glance at the cavity, the dentist was all set to do the job. The tools lined up beside the dental chair looked intimidating. My worst nightmare was about to begin. To start with, the dentist applied some anaesthetic gel 20 on my gum.
