## Did you know?



Badminton was played more than 2000 years ago in Greece, China and India. It was named 'badminton' after Badminton House, the home of the Duke of Beaufort, England. Football or soccer began in England in 1863. The education authorities observed that the sport taught students qualities such as loyalty, cooperation and team spirit. Participation in football became compulsory in many schools.



Table tennis, first known as 'ping pong', started in England in the 1880s as an after-dinner pastime. The game became popular, and by 1901, table-tennis tournaments were being conducted all over England.





Basketball was invented in 1891 in Massachusetts, USA, by a teacher, James Naismith. He wanted a game that was less injury-prone than football.



Golf originated from Scotland in 1497. It is played by striking a featherstuffed ball with club-shaped tree branches. Tennis started in France as a game where players used their palms to hit balls. Players started using rackets in the 15th century. In 1873, a Londoner, Walter Wingfield, invented the game, 'Playing Ball', which evolved to the modern tennis we play today.

The hike to the summit of Mauna Loa, or "Long Mountain" in Hawaii, is about 40 kilometres. The biggest active volcano on Earth, it rises gradually from the sea to 4169 metres, but its flat terrain and gentle slopes can be deceiving. The weather on the mountain is unpredictable although the forecast called for mostly sunny days.

It was Monday. Alex Sverdlov had landed in Hawaii the previous day and signed up with the National Park Service for a permit to hike and stay overnight in the Mauna Loa area. He walked towards the trail and paused at a warning sign: "Freezing conditions may occur at any time of the year. Beware!" But he knew what to expect – he had climbed the volcano alone a year ago and found it peaceful but challenging enough to climb again. Strenuous activities appealed to him. He began the climb. He knew he would be back on Wednesday to meet friends for dinner. His hiking trip was going perfectly and he spent the night at a wooden cabin.

When he awoke on Tuesday, he saw that clouds had rolled in overnight. He was not concerned. As he continued trekking, it started to snow. When he reached the summit at noon, a white curtain of fog shrouded his view. Soon after he began his descent, it started snowing harder. The wind blasted the flakes into his face, partially blinding him.

The snow was up to his shins and he tumbled onto his back. His knee hurt but he felt fortunate – the fall should have broken his leg. He marched on. His confidence was strong. "What an adventure," he thought. He stopped to take a drink, only to find that the water in his bottle had frozen. Despite his thirst, he knew better than to eat snow, which would lower his body temperature and hasten dehydration.

As his surroundings faded into blackness, the trail markers were hard to make out. He sat down, hugging his legs and tucking one fleece sleeve into the other to keep his hands from freezing. In the thin air, less oxygen reached his brain. Combined with the lack of water, this made him dizzy. With his body no longer in motion, his core temperature began to drop.

As the hours passed, he felt enveloped by the warmth and comfort of a blanket. He felt he was no longer on the mountain. He was floating in mid-air. In this manner, he moved in and out of hallucinations. Then, he snapped back to reality. "I'm still here!" he shouted.

John Broward was Hawaii Volcanoes National Park's search-and-rescue coordinator. When he had earlier arrived at the Centre on Tuesday morning, the weather forecast showed a snowstorm on the way. A search-and-rescue mission could begin only after a hiker was overdue. A check of the park permits showed that Alex Sverdlov should be back on Wednesday. Sverdlov would not be officially missing until his scheduled return. He was on his own for now. In case Sverdlov did not turn up by Wednesday night, John Broward gathered his staff and laid out the plans.

On Wednesday, when Sverdlov awoke, he found that he had survived the night. He continued moving but kept coughing badly and was exhausted. "Perhaps this situation is beyond me," he thought. He had trusted his hiking experience and had made it this far without serious injury but it was only a matter of time before the elements defeated him.

It was the thrill of a rescue that had drawn John Broward to the job when he was at university. However, he felt no thrill on Thursday morning, but was a bundle of nerves. The helicopter lifted off at 8.30 a.m. It moved slowly for Broward to scan for clues – footprints, an object or a movement. To Broward, the snow was **now a blessing**. The unbroken white landscape that made it easy for a hiker
