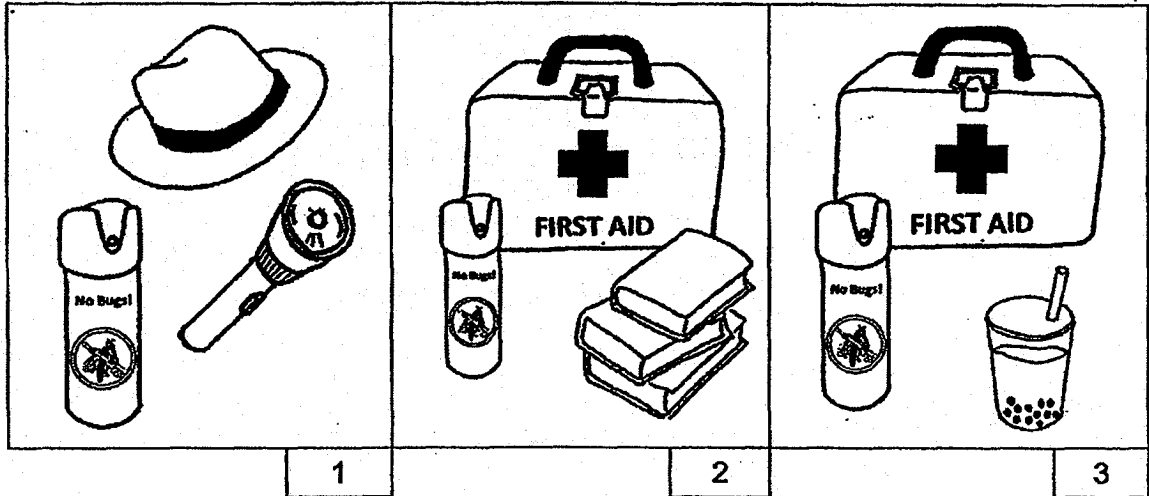

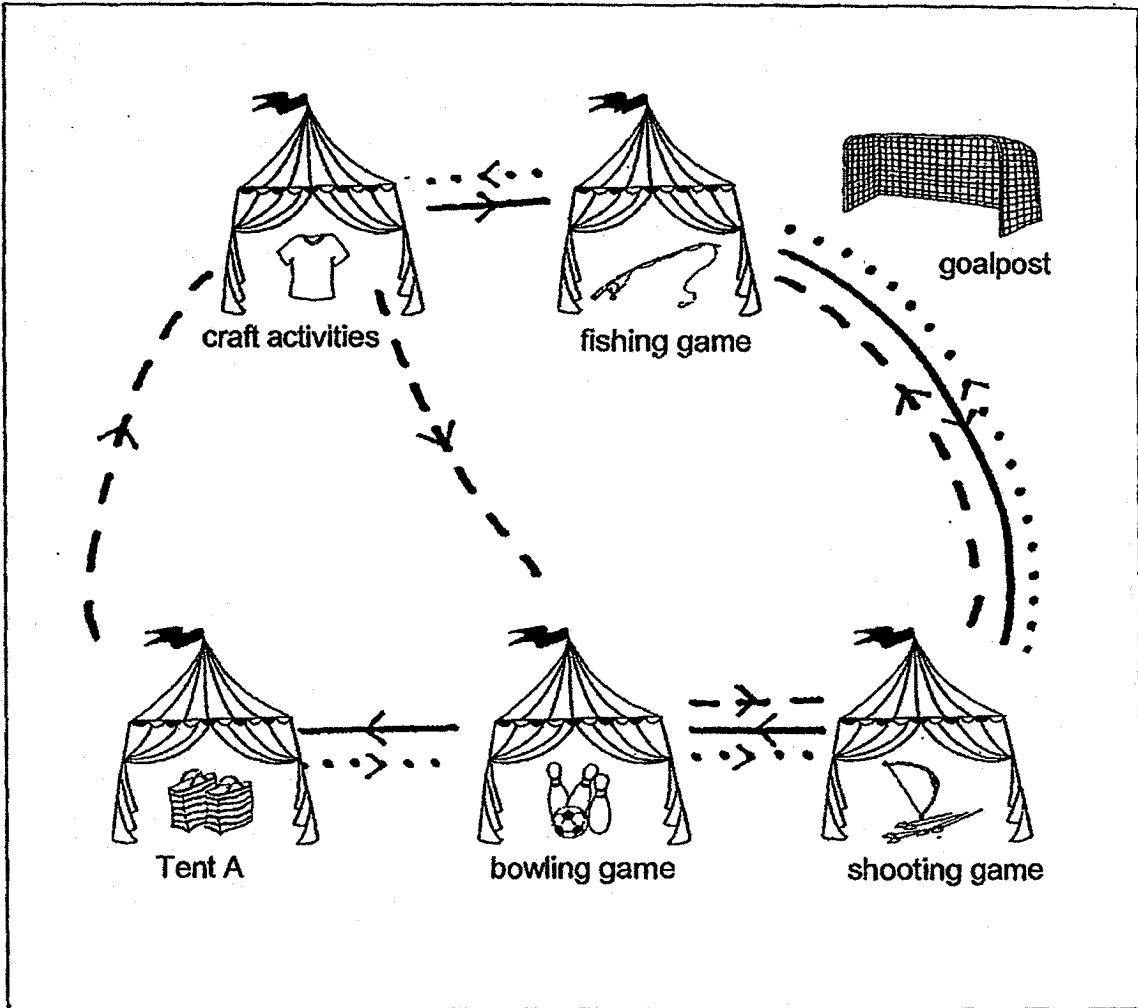

Dung beetles are one of the most useful but least appreciated animals. Found worldwide on every continent except Antarctica, (51)_____ brilliant bugs live in habitats ranging from dry deserts (52)_____ lush forests. They clean up our environment by feeding on the dung produced by other animals.
