To keep your birds in good trim, it is important not to overfeed. Overfed birds simply become (21) sluggish. In this regard, they are just like their masters. 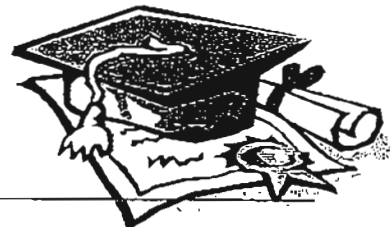
