

Very soon, he discovered a thin, oval olive-green stone that was almost transparent when you held it to the light – the largest piece of pure jade he had ever seen. He was so excited by his find that he forgot to watch the trees any more; he leapt from rock to rock, his bag chattering as it bobbled up and down on his shoulder.

The river was narrower, darker, tumbling through a tunnel of boulders and driftwood. And suddenly, from the terrace above, a wild creek gushed down to the river, plunging into a great boulder-strewn pool where the water flowed dark and deep. There seemed to be no way getting past. The sky had grown overcast, and a fine drizzling rain had begun to fall. Christopher knew he had to make his way out quick. He looked up at the terrace and wondered what he would do if the river rose. His father had warned him that it flooded very quickly whenever there was heavy rain in the back country. You could get trapped there.

Then half-hidden in the deep fem and scrub, he saw the steps. They had been roughly hewn out of the clay to make a stairway up the terrace—a secret path. 

"One of my legs is gone," Sofia said.

He looked into her tired eyes. Her face was covered with cuts from the explosion. He felt the rage in his heart again. This is a child who has been deprived of the ability to run, he thought. An African girl who will never dance again.

He realized that she thought only one of her legs was gone. She still hadn't noticed that they had also removed the second one. He knew that he would have to tell her. That would be better than letting her find out for herself when she was alone.

He wished he didn't have to. He wished he would never again have to see a girl like Sofia in a hospital bed, torn to pieces by a landmine. Even so, he dared to believe that 15 this girl would survive. There was still a risk that she could get infections. But he thought she might make it. She had an unusual strength. Of course, he would never fully understand the torment she was enduring.

Strength had nothing to do with a man being able to lift a hundred kilograms above his head. Strength was a child who survived treading on a landmine. He had heard from the nurses that Sofia rarely cried. She cried silently through all the pain.
