Tips on how to spot a shoplifter and what to do

Notice their appearance and behaviour



Don't be fooled by shoppers trying to look smart and stylish. Shoplifters may attempt to cover their identity by wearing hooded clothing and sunglasses. Hooded jackets might give the false impression that the shopper simply wants to keep warm.


Most also loiter around their targets, thinking of the right move or waiting for the coast to be clear.

Group theft has become rather common. A group of 4 to 8 people may enter a shop separately, appearing to be independent customers, but work together to steal an item. Some even carry dangerous weapons like knives.

Beware of group theft



Watch out for distraction tactics



Other than group theft, shoplifters may work in pairs. One person works to keep the attention of the shop attendant away from the other. This makes it easier for them to steal without being spotted.

The person may ask many questions or simply block his line of sight so he cannot see the accomplice make his move.

If you see someone acting suspiciously, don't take matters into your own hands. Instead, contact the mall security or better yet, call the police. It is better to be safe than sorry.

foreign domestic workers (FDWs). From 1 January 2019, employers (29)
