Life in Singapore in the 1930s was carefree even though war had just started raging in Europe. I lived with my parents in a wooden house on Ganges Road.

I remembered the monsoon seasons when fierce rain clouds would roll in frequently. It poured heavily and noisily for hours during the day. At sundown, the frogs croaked from the wasteland. Incessant and loud, it reminded Father of his childhood days in Tao Yuan 5 Chun, a village in China. His family was very poor. When he was young, Father started working for a farmer in the paddy fields. Months later, that farmer taught him how to catch frogs.

"I often waded into the paddy fields to catch frogs as there were many to catch. Your grandmother was always happy whenever I came home with something extra for the 10 cooking pot. On these occasions, all my family members cleaned their plates. Nothing was left," he said. He always smiled when he told me this story of his childhood. I, on the other hand, found the thought of touching the slimy frogs revolting.

One day, Father decided that he was going to try and catch some frogs. He was planning to bring me along on my first frog hunt. It would be fun, he told me and that 15 convinced me to give it a try. However, my mother was against his idea. I told her that I was already Father's age when he started catching frogs and eventually, she gave in. I told Father that I would bring along some butterfly nets.

"When you spot a frog, raise the net with your hands and quickly bring it down over the creature," said Father, demonstrating with his net. "Stay there and don't move until I come 20 and take it from underneath." I readily agreed as I really did not want to touch a frog.

When the sun flashed its last rays, our hunt began in earnest, My heart pounded against my chest. The ground on the wasteland was overgrown with mimosa plants full of thoms. The nasty weeds pricked our feet from the sides as we were wearing slippers. It was uncomfortable to walk in them. There was also tall grass, commonly known as *lalang*, on the wasteland. Parting the *lalang* as we went, we were careful not to get cut by their sharp edges. Soon, we realised it was not easy to use the net. The *lalang* was far too long.
