Daniel had spent many hours climbing the mountain. He knew that success was near. However, just as he was about to reach the top, something caught his eye. When he realised what it was, Daniel's jaw dropped.

Lying precariously on the edge of a cliff was a man trying to change his shirt! He appeared to have made it that far up the mountain without an oxygen mask, sleeping bag, food or water. Miraculously, he was still alive. The man slowly pulled his shivering hands out of his shirt, looked up at Daniel and introduced himself as John. 5

John had been alone on the mountain for five hours. Following a challenging climb, he and his teammates had reached the peak of the mountain the previous afternoon. After celebrating their achievement by posing for victory photos, the team started climbing down to the base camp at the foot of the mountain. Unfortunately, minutes into the trek down, John started vomiting and was overcome by dizziness. Though he did not realise it, John was suffering from mountain sickness. He had not been affected by this illness the last time he had climbed this very same mountain and was baffled by what was happening to him. 10

John was very weak and could barely move. If the satellite phone which they had had not run out of battery the team would have been able to contact the base camp for help. Thus, his teammates had to carry him and try to reach the camp as quickly as possible before the impending storm. Normally, the journey back to the base camp would have taken about four hours. However, after eight backbreaking hours, they were still on the mountain. John's teammates were too exhausted to continue carrying him. Knowing that their lives would be in danger if they continued to climb down together with John, they decided to leave him on the mountain so that they could get to the base camp quickly and get immediate help for John. 15 20

At the point that Daniel spotted John, he and his teammates realised that they had to make a critical decision – one that would determine whether John lived or not. Should they continue their trek to the top? Or should they stay with John until help arrived? 25

Daniel knew that severe mountain sickness led to confusion in people. That probably explained why John was trying to remove his shirt even though he was freezing on the icy mountain. When Daniel tried to stop John from taking off his shirt, John was uncooperative and acted like a three-year-old throwing a tantrum. It looked like the mountaineers would have to secure John to the mountain to keep him from falling off so they quickly drove an axe into the snow and tied John to the axe. With the pitiful and helpless climber safely secured, Daniel contacted the base camp to seek assistance while his teammates tried to make John as comfortable as possible. 30

Soon after, a dozen guides arrived to help John. They carried him down to the base camp on a stretcher. With John in the good hands of the guides, Daniel and his team decided to continue their climb to the summit but bad weather forced them to turn back. Although Daniel did not achieve his goal, he was glad that he had done the right thing. If not, John might not be alive today and Daniel would have to live with that guilt for the rest of his life. 35
