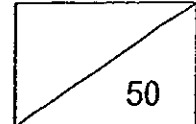

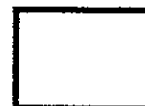

Read the following passage carefully.

In the past few years, thousands of children from war-torn countries have been seeking refuge by making their way to Europe. Very often, they have to travel without their ^{asking for help} parents and under no supervision from any adults. Yet, these children decide to make this long and treacherous journey because it is even riskier for them to stay in their countries as war, extreme poverty and the constant fear of abuse have made their lives unbearable. They leave their hometowns with the vague hope that Europe will offer them a better life.

Thirteen-year-old cousins, Sohrab and Morteza, recently told the *Guardian* newspaper their story. They had lived in Afghanistan, a place where conditions are especially bad. In fact, a report by *Unicef* has described this country as the world's most dangerous place for a child. Children often get caught in the crossfire. As such, thousands have been maimed in the battles. Others are kidnapped and forced to become child workers. This non-stop violence has also meant that many of them have to go without proper food, water, medical care and education.

After Sohrab and Morteza had lost their parents in the blasts, relatives thought it would be better if the boys joined an uncle in Europe. However, it was not as easy as getting on a plane and flying there. Matters were also complicated as the boys did not have the necessary documents nor sufficient money to allow them to migrate to another country. The only way to reach their destination was to travel by land and then smuggle themselves into the country without being caught by the immigration authorities.
