



Hence, it was only natural that my grasp of the English language was weak when I started school. Though I had been looking forward to making new friends, I felt lost when I first set foot in the classroom. I was the only student who could not communicate in English. I could only look at my teachers blankly and blushed with embarrassment whenever a question was directed to me.

It just took a few days before someone gave me an unflattering nickname which made me feel inferior. I could not remember his name but he was seated just a few seats away from me. The arrogant boy took great delight in mocking me for my accent. It continued for a couple of weeks and I felt miserable. He was also the holder of our class' reading award. The award was an honour given periodically to a student based on his or her academic excellence and fluency in reading. Deep in my heart, I wanted that award for myself. I wanted to prove to him that I was also capable of being as smart as him.

The only person that made my first year bearable for me was my kind and patient English teacher. Her name was Mrs Collins. She developed a plan to help me master the English language. Mrs Collins and I would spend half an hour a day reading a story book. We started with a simple story book and she would help me sound out short and easy sentences such as "Tom is a boy." and "See the dog run." Soon, I was saturated with letters, sounds and stories. I absorbed them all like sponge. By midyear, I was able to speak English fluently and had a good grasp of reading. Mrs Collins was happy with my progress. She said that I had an ear for language. With the reading award ceremony coming up, I worked as hard as I could. The day finally came, and I was so nervous.

When Mrs Collins announced me as the winner, it was my proudest moment. I got a fancy certificate and a blue ribbon that she pinned to my dress. My achievement caused a mini uproar. The mother of the boy who had mocked me lodged a complaint. She found it incredulous that someone who had just learnt English could be so fluent a speaker as to take the award from her son. But in her strong, gentle way, Mrs Collins stood her ground. Mrs Collins' firmness helped to boost my sense of confidence. From that day onwards, I worked even harder in school and my grades eventually improved.

Mrs Collins did not just teach me English. She had also helped me find my 'voice'. More importantly, she had instilled in me the persevering spirit which till this day 3 has guided me through the challenges in my life.
