





Deep in the Hoang Lien Mountains of north-western Vietnam, a day's walk from the nearest road, lay the H'mong village of Na Hang – fourteen barn-like houses of medieval simplicity almost lost among the trees. The forests sweeping up to the mountains beyond are home to the critically endangered western blackcrested gibbon, one of the flagship species we are encouraging the H'mong villagers to stop hunting and help protect.

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It was 5.30 a.m., almost time for the gibbons to start calling. The H'mong were also early risers, but this particular morning seemed even busier than usual. There was a **party atmosphere**. The place was full of hornets, in every stage of development – from shapeless grubs to fully-formed adults.

The previous afternoon, the eldest son of the household had discovered a hornets' nest, which the villagers had unearthed during the night. All ten storeys, each the span of a cartwheel, were stacked around the house and the floor was littered with hexagonal debris. A group of villagers sat around the fire, plucking grubs from their cells and tossing them into a pot. These grubs – which 15 resembled Brazilian nuts when toasted – became breakfast.

Beside the door, a bulging sack of smoke-dazed adults gave off a rattling sound. This was the valuable part of the haul. While the grubs were a breakfast treat, the adults meant money. As with most wildlife in Vietnam, hornets are prized medicinally when steeped in local rice wine, known as *ruou*. To 20 accompany the roasted grubs, our hosts produced a bottle, clouded by use, in which a number of suspended hornets revolved dreamily. *Ruou* is to the H'mong what wine is to the French, and no opportunity is lost in finding reasons to drink it. Given that our two-week training programme had been a success, there was good reason for celebration. Signus and I were not getting off lightly – each meal 25 was accompanied by endless rounds of the stuff, and a polite refusal was not an option.

After dinner, two of our trainees, Lu and Sua, invited us to sample some "special" *ruou* at their dwelling. The brew appeared served in chipped porcelain cups, fashioned in miniature as if for a doll's house. This brew was apparently of 30 an ancient vintage. It had a warm, reddish colour and tasted different. Sua, meanwhile, delivered a eulogy on its curative properties, claiming that it had thirty ingredients - thirty different animals to be exact.

Before we could ask, Lu interrupted, "I promise it doesn't contain any gibbon."

"Oh child, you warm the cockles of my heart," she said.

"You have cockles in your heart, Grandma?"

She laughed. Grandma smelled like vanilla and coffee. I remember the first time we made cookies from scratch. I thought one of the cups of stuff she put into the bowl was "scratch". She explained, "There are two kinds of cookies; storebought and scratch."

Grandma had a secret recipe and it was magical because it did not matter if we put raisins or nuts or chocolate chips in the batter, the cookies always tasted like heaven. Grandma gave me her secret "scratch" recipe and 1 kept it in my wooden treasure box under my bed.

I also had a four-leaf clover, framed and kept in my box. We had spent two hours crawling around on our hands and knees in her backyard looking for that fourleaf clover. We held hands and danced in a circle when I finally spotted one. I ran forward and plucked the **treasure** from the base of its stem and held it aloft.

Grandma had what she called a "bottomless" candy dish - a little open glass dish stationed on a coffee table in her living room near a window with a flowing lace curtain. I could eat candy in the afternoon and after dinner in the evening. The next morning, the candy dish was full again. It was filled to the brim with mints of all colours that with minimum sucking would sweeten the palate and send a hand plunging inside for more. However, whenever I offered Grandma a mint, she would laugh and say, "Excessive sugar for a senior can turn a managed waistline into a glob of pullout fat in a short amount of time."

Grandma's porch swing was my favourite place in the whole world. I would lean against her and pour out my woes without a care in the world. This was my most treasured moment. Sometimes, we found pictures in the clouds as Grandma gave the swing a nudge once in a while with her foot.
